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# "Prepare the way of the Lord..." ...

John was born to Zacharias and Elizabeth, who were of a priestly family. Elizabeth herself was related to Mary, the mother of Jesus. After the description of how John was to be born, the scripture makes no further statements of the lives of Zachariah or Elizabeth.

The description of John appearance in the wilderness is brief and stark. He is dressed a "camel's hair" garment, and his food is of locusts and wild honey, generally consumed by the poor. This description of John recalls the Old Testament prophets, particularly Elijah who was an important figure in Jewish tradition. John's mission can be summed up by the word "preparer." It was his task to prepare a people for the coming Messiah. Indeed,

Hebrews, familiar with the Scriptures, could have expected the ministry of John as paving the way for the appearance of the Messiah, as foretold by the prophet Isaiah. He becomes known as the 'the Baptist' as he calls to the people to 'a baptism of repentance'. The preaching of John the Baptist had three main points: John's message concerning the coming of Jesus; his emphasis on the coming kingdom and his warning of ultimate judgment. John's preaching is a witness to the nature of the Christ. As the prophet generates attention, the Temple Authorities in Jerusalem dispatched a delegation to ascertain his identity. In response, John is emphatic that he is not the promised Messiah. He is instead the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy, the voice that calls the people to prepare for the arrival of God in the flesh among them. The declaration of John that he was unworthy to either carry Jesus' sandals is stunning testimony that the One who is to come is not simple another prophet or another man carrying a message from God but is 'the Christ', the Lord Who as "the lamb of God will take away the sin of the world". In this description, John identifies Jesus as the Passover sacrifice; foretells the vicarious nature of Jesus' death and affirms the universality of Jesus' mission as Saviour of all the nations.

#### Preparing during Advent ... ...

Advent is all about preparing ourselves, about getting our lives in order. It is about getting ready to celebrate once again the Birth of Christ and also to be ready to greet the Lord when He returns in glory.

To be prepared is to answer the call of John the Baptist. We need to clear away those things in our lives that prevent us from having a true and deep relationship with God.

We need to take the time to stop and take stock of our lives. Through prayer, acts of charity and spiritual readings we come to see the important things in life, the things we should focus our minds and hearts upon. It is only by doing this we comprehend the important things in life and can let go of the rest..

# First Reading from the Prophet Isaiah

Through the Prophet Isaiah God tells the people that they need worry no longer. Their sins against Him have been atoned for. They will hear a voice crying out for them to prepare a place for the Lord in their heart. They must then remove the obstacles they have placed between themselves and God, opening their hearts to receiving His grace. The glory of the Lord shall be revealed to them, their God shall return to them, and he will care for them as a shepherd cares for his flock.

# Second Reading from the Letters of Saint Peter

Saint Peter tells the early Christian Church that with God 'a day' can mean a thousand years, time has no meaning for Him. The Lord is always true to His promises, but they must be patient in waiting for Him. The end of time will come, for the Lord has promised it will be so, but at what time they do not know. While they wait, they must live lives true to the faith so that they may not be caught by surprise. While waiting they must do their best to live as God has commanded.

## Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark

This, the prologue of Saint Mark's Gospel, recounts the appearance of John the Baptist. Echoing the words of the Prophet Isaiah, John calls upon the people to prepare 'a way for the Lord'. John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, dressed as a prophet from of old, proclaiming a call to repentance. People from all over the land came to him to hear his words and to be baptised in the River Jordan. But he told them he was not the Promised Messiah. Someone else is to come who is far greater than he is. He will be so great that John will not be worthy to be His most menial of servants. When He comes, He will baptise them with the Holy Spirit.

#### Tuesday ~ Memorial of Saint Lucy

Born in 283, to a wealthy Roman Christian family living in Syracuse in Sicily. At a young age her father died, and the family was placed under the care of her uncle. When she came of age, Lucy decided to distribute to the poor all the money and jewels she had inherited. Such actions brought her to the attention of the authorities who arrested her for being a Christian which had been outlawed by the Emperor Diocletian. She was ordered to be put to death and was martyred on 13th Dec in the year 304.

## Wednesday ~ Memorial of Saint John of the Cross

Born in 1542 in Castile, he was raised in poverty. He joined the Carmelite Order but soon realised that the order had drifted away from its original charism. He suffered much for trying to restore the discipline of his Order. With the aid of Saint Teresa he would establish the Discalced Carmelites dedicated to the Primitive Rule. He was a renowned as a man of praver and wrote many great spiritual works He died in the
