Repent and Believe.....

If we are honest and ask ourselves how often and how quickly am I willing to point the finger? I am sure that we may find that it is far more often that we are willing to admit. Unfortunately, we are not as quick to forgive as we are to condemn. Yes, there are times when we must point the finger and say - "this or that is wrong" but we must be just as willing to say - "I forgive you" or "please forgive me". Forgiveness is the first step towards our own inner peace and sense of happiness. The first step in this process is the rejection of our sinfulness and both the recognition that we need forgiveness and the willingness to accept the forgiveness we need. Sin has an ability to numb our sense of right and wrong. The more of a hold it gets over our lives the less we become aware of the affects it is having on us and the easier its spreading become.

In our society there are many events which only a number of years would have caused outrage - the attacking of the old, the rising amount of robbery, the killing of innocent people. But we have become so accustomed to seeing and hearing of these types of things that, though we may be upset, our moral outrage has been numbed. Now it takes more and more the "shockingness" of an event to cause us to react.

And so, it is with sin. Sin numbs our conscience, so we no longer react to its presence. It is like a disease which creeps through us and disables us. It rots away our sense of responsibility we have to God, ourselves and others - placing constant barriers between us. Sin has an effect on an individual person, but it also has its effects on the society as a whole. Contrary to the new popular view, we cannot "do what we want, when we want" - because no matter what we do it somehow always effect other people. Each person has the freedom to make choices for themselves, but with this freedom comes the awesome responsibility of accepting the consequences, and there are always consequences.

Jesus called on the Apostle, Peter, Andrew, James and John, to leave what they know and to follow Him, to completely change their way of life. Jonah and Saint Paul echo's this calling in the readings - the call to repent and change their ways. We too are called to examine our lives. To see if we have gone further from God, further from the loving mercy that is evident in the death of Christ.

The call to repentance is not negative, but the most positive thing we can do in our lives. This is the call to opening up our hearts to the saving grace of God - the grace which enables us to be lifted up out of the limitations of this world and helps us to look forward to the future with confidence, and courage to know we are doing what is right and to stay with it.

This Week's Saints & Feasts

Monday ~ Optional Memorial of Saint Vincent.

A deacon in the Church of Saragossa in Spain, he was martyred after prolonged torture in 304.

Wednesday ~ Memorial of Saint Francis de Sales.

In 1567, he was ordained a priest and later became Bishop of Geneva. He founded the Sisters of the Visitation and as Bishop gently rebuilt the Church after the Reformation.

Thursday ~Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul

After dedicating himself totally to the pursuit of the destruction of the 111 Christians, Paul has encounter with Christ that makes him change his ways. From being 'the greatest enemy of the faith' he became one of 'the greatest of the preachers in the Church and defender of the faith'.



Thursday ~ Memorial of Saint Timothy & Saint Titus

Timothy and Titus were close followers of Saint Paul. Timothy was the firs in 64ad and Titus travelled on to Crete to preach the Gospel there. In 93ad Timothy was killed by a mob reacting to his preaching. Unlike Saint Timothy, Saint Titus was not martyred, but died peacefully in old age.
